

Supporting Research into Child Health

1. Introduction

- (a) The Western Australian Early-Career Child Health Researcher (ECCHR) Fellowships Program (the Program) is a Co-Funding Partnerships Program that is managed and administered by the BrightSpark Foundation Company Ltd1¹ as the Program Administrator and currently is funded by the:
 - Future Health Research and Innovation (FHRI) Fund;
 - Stan Perron Charitable Foundation (SPCF); and
 - BrightSpark Foundation (Foundation).

(together Program Sponsors).

- (b) The FHRI Fund provides a secure source of funding to drive health and medical research, innovation and commercialisation and through these activities, improve the health and prosperity of all Western Australians. It also provides an opportunity to diversify the economy, create jobs, improve the sustainability of the health system and position Western Australia (WA) as a leader in research and innovation.
- (c) The Program contributes to the following FHRI Fund Priority Goals:
 - Establish co-funding partnerships that will secure genuinely new non-government funding for research and innovation aligned with Priorities for the FHRI Fund
 - Support the development of early- and mid-career researchers, helping them to achieve an independent and self-sustaining career
 - Target high-performing researchers in WA to maintain and/or advance the State's position as a leader in health and medical research.
- (d) Since its inception in 1978, the SPCF has donated more than \$150 million to organisations and individuals with a significant focus on Mr Perron's heartfelt desire to help Western Australian children battling illness, disability and disadvantage. The SPCF funds both Community and Research Grants and prioritises co-funded (partnership) applications.
- (e) For more than 45 years, the BrightSpark Foundation has supported over 200 researchers in WA (alumni) and distributed nearly \$10 million in child health research funding. Since 2015 the Foundation has collaborated with the <u>Raine Medical Research</u> <u>Foundation</u> to co-fund annual Priming Grants to emerging researchers and other collaboration awards for WA based child health research projects assessed on a competitive basis.

- (f) The BrightSpark Foundation provides funding to deliver better health outcomes to the community, through early-career researcher programs that support the next generation of research leaders in WA.
- (g) The purpose of the Program is to:
 - encourage WA based postdoctoral early-stage researchers to stay involved with child health research longer
 - support early-career researchers to establish their child health research credentials in order for them to progress into more senior and securely funded child health research career roles.
- (h) The Program Sponsors may be expanded or modified from time to time as the Program develops and grows.

2. Program Description

- (a) The Program provides salary and research project support (the Fellowship) to earlycareer researchers to undertake child health research projects (either their own and/or as a collaborator on other child health research projects) and develop research skills and career capabilities.
- (b) The intention is to support the Fellows to become better qualified, experienced and positioned to seek longer term and more advanced substantial child health research funding through avenues such as the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) Investigator Grants Emerging Leadership scheme. Please see Annexure 1 for further information.
- (c) The Fellow's research activity must be:
 - undertaken in WA with a WA based Research Entity (university, health service provider, medical research institute or foundation)
 - supported by a suitably qualified WA based professional research supervisor throughout the term of the Fellowship (Research Supervisor)
 - be of relevance to significant child health needs and lead to better health outcomes for children.
- (d) The Program recognises that early-career researchers may not yet have a credible child health research project that by itself merits funding. The review and assessment process will focus on the demonstrated commitment, capacity and skillset of the applicant and track record of their Research Supervisor and Research Entity to ensure the Fellowship is successful.
- (e) Subject to quality applications the Program will award at least one Fellowship in each round for Aboriginal² related child health research projects. Please see Annexure 2 for further information.

3. Eligibility

(a) Applicants for this Program must meet the following eligibility criteria:

- be currently undertaking research in child health research including allied health and health sciences; and
- be an early-career researcher who has:
 - a. just completed or is nearing completion (within six months) of a PhD, most preferably (not mandatory) in an area related to child health research; or
 - b. has the cumulative equivalent of no more than 5 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) years (0-5 years relative to opportunity³) postdoctoral research experience.

(together 'Eligible Candidates').

- (b) The Program is open to applicants who:
 - subject to funding, plan to commence a child health research project soon after, (most preferably from the 1 January and no later than the 1 July, in the year immediately following), the date of conferral of their PhD or award of the Fellowship, as applicable.
 - during the period of the Fellowship, will not undertake more than 0.5 FTE paid research time (including paid research time which is a component of an academic/clinical/administration/part-time role) that is funded from sources other than the Fellowship.
 - are not the lead investigator on an NHMRC, Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF) or equivalent grant or have been awarded independent (outside their organisation and not including tenders, non-research funding and philanthropic funding) or competitively peer reviewed grant funding greater than \$50,000 for a project they lead or have led since completing their PhD.
 - have nil or minimal ongoing committed funding support for their child health research proposal.
 - are an Australian or New Zealand citizen, a permanent resident of Australia, or have an appropriate work visa in place for the period of the Fellowship.
 - nominate a WA based Research Supervisor, who will be a senior/established researcher active in child health research, who undertakes to:
 - a. stringently review the application
 - b. provide expert advice on the design and statistical analyses included in the research activity
 - c. provide guidance and ongoing support during the period of the Fellowship
 - d. assist with reporting on progress directly to the Program Sponsors
 - e. ensure the application includes only one project; and
 - f. be listed as a Research Supervisor on no more than one application per round.
 - have no overdue reports for any Department of Health, or FHRI Fund grant funding program from any year (excludes authorised extensions).
 - The applicant will be required to specify which of the following applies:
 - a. employee of the Research Entity; or

- b. honorary or adjunct title at the Research Entity. If the Fellowship recipient is or will be employed by another entity (the Employer), the Employer must have a physical and operational presence in WA, and confirmation must be provided that either:
 - a) an affiliation agreement exists between the Research Entity and the relevant Employer; or
 - b) the intention is for the Fellowship to be subcontracted to the relevant Employer.
- The Research Entity must:
 - a. have an active Australian Business Number (ABN)
 - b. have a physical and operational presence in WA
 - c. be a WA university, WA research institution, WA public health service provider or a WA public-private partnership provider
 - co-partner with the Program Sponsors by agreeing to contribute at least a minimum gap share⁴ of the overall total Fellowship funding package amounts.
- The Program is not open to applicants who already have been awarded an Early-Career Child Health Researcher Fellowship or a Raine Priming Grant.
- Applications must be submitted in accordance with the 'Application Instructions' section of this document.

4. Funding

- (a) Fellowship funding will provide FTE salary support to undertake child health research duties, as well as to contribute to direct research costs (consumables) up to a maximum amount per annum. The Fellowship will be provided for a maximum of three years.
- (b) During the term of the Fellowship, clinical, academic, or other professional part-time duties carried out in a WA based hospital or health service provider or WA based tertiary institution may be continued but the FTE commitment to the Fellowship research at the Research Entity must be maintained at a minimum of 0.5 FTE. Should this requirement cease to be met, then the Fellowship funding may also cease or be suspended, unless special circumstances apply (e.g. carer leave including parental leave, where funding may be suspended and/or deferred).
- (c) The Fellowship funding package is \$360,000 over three years, or \$120,000 per year for a 1.0 FTE commitment. The level of Fellowship support is designed as a 1.0 FTE funding package contribution, and a pro-rata share of the full salary component for a particular year is still payable even where the FTE is less than 1.0, noting however that the child health research time commitment must be at least 0.5 FTE. The full salary component will be adjusted pro-rata for Fellowships involving less than a 1.0 FTE but greater than a 0.5 FTE commitment. For example, if the researcher is committing and spending the equivalent of three days a week (0.6 FTE) on the Fellowship, then 60% of the salary is payable from the salary component of the funding package.

- (d) Funding may be applied towards:
 - base salary components (including holiday, annual or compassionate leave accrued and taken within the period of the Fellowship), with Program Sponsors funding contributing a maximum of \$90,000 per annum (excluding on-costs)
 - up to 15% on-costs⁵ (including statutory superannuation limited to the equivalent of the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) <u>super guarantee levy</u>) per annum
 - direct research costs (DRCs) allowance of up to \$16,500⁶ per annum.
 - The Fellow's employing Research Entity must also contribute a minimum 30% share of the overall three years FTE funding package (Minimum Gap Contribution). The following Table summarises the funding package contributions for a Fellow committed to the project at 1.0 FTE.

- (e) Any additional salary (above \$90,000 per annum), on-costs and DRCs costs are to be carried solely by the employing Research Entity in addition to their committed Minimum Gap Contribution.
- (f) The base salary component of the funding package may be applied towards payment of salary during holiday, annual or compassionate leave taken, but not towards entitlements for any untaken annual leave, long service leave, or extended leave (incl. parental leave) or severance, redundancy and termination payments that may arise or be accrued during the Fellowship term.
- (g) Any salary, severance and termination payments and long service leave or extended leave (incl. parental leave) entitlements related to or leave entitlements accrued in non-Fellowship roles are not supported and must not be paid for with Fellowship funding.
- (h) Any salary, on-cost or other expenses related to the successful applicant for the awarded Fellowship FTE and duration which is beyond the term of the awarded Fellowship is the responsibility of the relevant Research Entity. If the successful applicant moves to a higher position classification (e.g. research officer to research fellow), this does not affect the Fellowship, which remains funded and payable at the position classification applicable at the time of application.
- (i) The provision of Fellowship funding to the relevant Research Entity will be administered by the Program Administrator on behalf of the Program Sponsors.
- (j) The Research Entity will invoice the Program Administrator at the commencement of each 6-month period of a Fellowship term. The invoice is to total the amount due from the Program Sponsors for the 6-month period.

- (k) Fellowship salary will be paid to the Fellowship recipient by the relevant employing Research Entity in accordance with their employment conditions.
- (I) The DRC allowance can be requested and applied without further approval for the cost of items directly related to the research e.g. access to relevant research databases, pathology tests, consumables, paper, publishing costs. Annual acquittal statements will be required.
- (m) Additional research project costs, not included in the Fellowship, will need to be obtained independently by the Fellowship recipient. Requests for travel funds and any/additional publication fees will not be approved.
- (n) The Fellowship funding must not be applied towards facility, administrative or other indirect costs that would be provided by an organisation in the normal course of undertaking and supporting health and medical research (e.g. those costs often incurred for common or joint objectives, utilities and services, regulatory and research compliance and administration of research services).
- (o) The Fellowship FTE, duration and research costs offered to each Fellowship recipient are subject to the discretion of the Program Sponsors. Fellowship funding is offered subject to the availability of funds, which could be varied in the event of unforeseen circumstances.
- (p) The Fellowship shall commence on 1 January in the year following the award of the grant. The Program Administrator should be informed of any potential delays to this commencement date as soon as possible. It is expected that the Fellowship will commence when the Fellowship recipient's PhD has been conferred, where applicable, and no later than the 1 July in the year immediately following the date of conferral of their PhD or award of the grant, as applicable.
- (q) Fellowship funding is based on the FTE commitment, duration and research costs and this funding amount is final. In the event the Fellowship recipient incurs additional expenses for whatever reason, these will not be paid by the Program Sponsors.
- (r) Fellowship deferrals will generally be supported in relation to carer responsibilities and major illness or injury.
- (s) Equipment purchased with Fellowship funding remains the property of the relevant employing Research Entity.
- (t) Fellowship funding that is used for purposes other than that for which it was awarded or is unspent at the conclusion of the Fellowship term, is repayable to the Program Administrator and shall revert to the Program Sponsors.

5. Consumer Involvement

In line with the NHMRC definition, consumers are people who have lived experience of a health issue. They include patients and potential patients, carers, and people who use health care services. Consumers can also be people who represent the views and interests of a consumer organisation, a community or a wider constituency.

Guidance on consumer involvement can be found at the Consumer and Community Involvement Program <u>website</u> and the <u>NHMRC Statement on Consumer and Community</u> <u>Involvement in Health and Medical Research 2016</u>. Applicants are encouraged complete the free online 30 minute Consumer and Community Involvement in Health Research <u>course</u>.

Applicants are encouraged to describe how consumers can and will be involved in the design of the Fellowship research and to detail the plan for ongoing engagement.

6. Applicant Selection Process

The applicant selection process shall be administered by the Program Administrator involving a five-stage process in the following order:

- (1) **Preliminary screening** by the Program Sponsors to check eligibility. Applicants will be notified at this time if the application is not eligible.
- (2) **Independent review and initial rank of Applications** by the Program Fellowship Advisory Panel (PFAP) comprising representatives from WA research organisations, the Program Sponsors and chaired by the BrightSpark Research Advisory Committee (BRAC) nominee. Applications will be assessed by the PFAP using the Assessment Criteria from Annexure 3.
- (3) PFAP discussion of top ranked Applications to consider and recommend top ranked Applications to the BRAC. This step may include an interview by members of the PFAP with Applicants and their Research Supervisor. Recommendations will consider paid research time already available to the Applicant and the intent of the Applicant's proposal. Applications will be finally assessed and ranked by the PFAP based on the interview (if any) and the Assessment Criteria and Weightings.
- (4) **PFAP submits a ranked merit list of the applications to the BRAC.** Funding recommendations in merit order will be made by the PFAP to the BRAC for review. The recommendations may include priority funding for top ranked applications in Aboriginal child health research.
- (5) BRAC submits funding recommendations to the BrightSpark Board. The BRAC will review the PFAP funding recommendations and make the final funding recommendations to the BrightSpark Board, any amendments to the merit order recommended by PFAP will be highlighted. The consideration and decision by the BrightSpark Board of the final recommendations by the BRAC may be informed by available budget considerations and be preceded by consultation with the Program Sponsors. The decision of the BrightSpark Board shall be final and shall be communicated to Applicants by the Program Administrator. Correspondence will not be entered into regarding the decision.

7. Assessment Criteria and Weighting

- (a) The review and assessment process will focus on the demonstrated commitment of the applicant and Research Supervisor to undertake child health research by assessing:
 - projects they have worked on that illustrate experiences and examples of:
 - leadership, mentoring (mentor or mentee) and training
 - funding management including progress milestones and acquittal reporting
 - contributions to the scientific community (e.g. committee work).

- publications they are listed on
- Research Supervisor's statement/recommendation
- Research Entity's commitment to supporting child health research, including preparedness and ability to:
 - support the Fellow throughout the period of the Fellowship
 - provide opportunities for the Fellow to progress and develop their child health research skills and research project management capabilities, including making available research facilities, conference attendance grants (where available) and publishing opportunities and support
 - support the applicant's expressions of interest and goals for continuing child health research in WA.
- the applicant's work program for undertaking a particular child health research project and how that meets the applicant's goals
- the applicant's team building and people management skills
- the applicant's genuine interest in pursuing a WA-based child health research career, including applicants progressing to an early-career researcher role equivalent to the NHMRC Investigator Grants Emerging Leadership Level 1.

Each application will be assessed based on the Assessment Criteria and Weightings outlined in Annexure 3.

8. Application Instructions

The instructions below must be followed when making a submission:

- (a) The online Application Form must be used. The link to the online Application Form is available to download from the <u>BrightSpark website</u>.
- (b) The completed application must be submitted by 1:00 PM (AWST) Thursday, 22 August 2024. No late submissions will be accepted. Note the closing date was extended from 13 August 2024 after the round was opened.
- (c) Electronic signatures are acceptable. The onus is on the applicant to ensure approval to use an electronic signature has been obtained.
- (d) Applications must be complete, include requested CVs, letters of support and certifications, and be submitted by the closing date/time. Applicants are responsible for complying with internal review deadlines.
- (e) Acknowledgement of receipt of application will be provided via email to the Research Entity within 5 working days of the closing date.

9. Grant Funding Agreement

(a) Fellowship funding will be paid in six-monthly instalments following execution of a Grant Funding Agreement with the Fellowship Recipient, their Research Supervisors and the relevant Research Entity and subsequently following the receipt of regular satisfactory progress reporting and there being no outstanding reports or breach or suspension of the Grant Funding Agreement. (b) The terms and conditions of the Grant Funding Agreement will be available on the Program Administrator's website.

10. Research Governance Requirements

- (a) Research projects supported through the Fellowships program will be conducted in accordance with the <u>Australian Code for Responsible Conduct of Research</u>.
- (b) The Research Entity will be responsible for obtaining any research ethics and governance approvals that might be required for undertaking funded activities and ensuring these are maintained as required for the duration of the funded activity.
- (c) Research ethics approvals must be obtained from appropriate ethics committees (human and/or animal). Research governance authorisation (also known as site specific authorisation) must be obtained from each relevant institution/site conducting the project or providing access to data, participants, or tissue samples.
- (d) For information on research ethics and governance submission requirements for the WA public health system please refer to the following websites: <u>Research Ethics</u>; <u>Research Governance</u>; <u>Multi-centre Research</u>

11. Use of Data Collections

- (a) A project that requires access to and use of WA Department of Health data collections requires review and approval for data release in accordance with the <u>Health Services Act</u> <u>2016</u> and the *Health Services (Information) Regulations 2017*. This is in addition to research ethics and governance approvals and will include a feasibility assessment to determine whether the data requested is appropriate for the purposes of the study and approval for use of the data, from the data custodian.
- (b) Preliminary cost and time estimates can be obtained from contacting <u>DataServ@health.wa.gov.au</u>. Cost estimates should be included in the proposed budget and an estimate of time for release of the data should be incorporated into the milestones in the application.
- (c) Should the applicant be awarded a Fellowship, it is recommended you immediately begin the data request and approval process.
- (d) If the use of WA Department of Health data collections is proposed, Information can be found at <u>Data Linkage Services</u>.

12. Intellectual Property

(a) The ownership of Intellectual Property produced by the successful applicant during the Fellowship shall vest with the employing Research Entity. Intellectual Property that is produced in conjunction with an external host research group or other organisation shall be owned and controlled consistently with the relevant IP research policies of the relevant employing Research Entity. (b) The Research Entity must agree to the following licence terms:

Subject to the confidentiality provisions of the Agreement, the Research Entity hereby grants to WA Health, a non-exclusive, irrevocable, perpetual, royalty-free licence to use (excluding the ability to sub-licence or grant further licences) any of the Intellectual Property generated in the research activity, and which falls within the scope of WA Health's normal activities. This includes, but is not necessarily limited to, activities related to healthcare provision, teaching, training and research. This license does not automatically extend to any potential or eventual commercial development of the Intellectual Property, and any commercial products that might directly or indirectly result from the research activity Intellectual Property. However, where the Research Entity believes that there is the potential for commercialisation of the Intellectual Property developed in the course of the research activity, both Parties shall negotiate in good faith the appropriate legal and beneficial interests, rights and access to the Intellectual Property by WA Health.

- (c) The Research Entity must ensure that appropriate agreements are in place with the Fellow, Research Supervisor and participating entities. This includes relevant permissions to use third-party IP required to deliver the research activity. When a recipient or a project team member(s) from the WA public health system is a participant (i.e. the WA public health entity is not the Research Entity), the IP agreement must be authorised at an appropriate level by the relevant WA public health system entity.
- (d) Any questions regarding such IP matters should, in the first instance, be directed to the Program Administrator.

13. Reports

- (a) At the completion of each calendar year, the Fellow is required to provide an Annual Progress Report, including an annual acquittal statement of expenditure of the funds during that calendar year.
- (b) If a satisfactory Annual Progress Report is not provided, then funding may be suspended or terminated.
- (c) At the completion of the Fellowship period, the Fellow is required to submit:
 - a Final Report
 - an acquittal statement of the expenditure of funds that is certified by the relevant finance officer of the relevant Research Entity.
- (d) If a satisfactory final report and/or acquittal statement is not provided when requested, applicants and/or the Research Entity may not be eligible for future funding through all or any of the Project Sponsors.
- (e) Guidelines, templates and due dates for reports and the acquittal statement will be provided to the Fellow by the Program Administrator as required.
- (f) Fellowship alumni will be asked to take part in follow-up questionnaires to evaluate research performance and impact that has come about after Fellowship funding and will inform the

review of future funding programs. Alumni are asked to keep the Program Administrator updated with any changes to their contact information.

14. Professional Development

Fellowship recipients are encouraged, during the term of the Fellowship, to:

- (a) seek an adjunct or honorary title with a WA University or another WA-based <u>NHMRC-approved administering institution</u> in order to apply for <u>NHMRC funding</u>.
- (b) familiarise themselves with the policies and procedures and timelines for applying for <u>NHMRC's Investigator Grants</u> Emerging Leadership scheme
- (c) complete the <u>WA Health Translation Network</u> (WAHTN) <u>Research Education and Training</u> <u>Program</u> (RETP) <u>Good Clinical Practice</u> (GCP) in Australia course, and other relevant WAHTN RETP <u>courses</u>.

15. Acknowledgement

- (a) The Minister for Medical Research and/or the Department of Health will publicly announce the recipients of the Fellowship. Fellowship recipients and all other parties must withhold announcement/media coverage until after the Program Administrator advises this has occurred.
- (b) Acknowledgment of the Program Sponsors support should be made as opportunities arise in publications, conference presentations, public discussion, press statements etc, as appropriate. The preferred citation is:

"This work is/has been supported through the Western Australian Early-Career Child Health Researcher Fellowships Program, which is a co-funded partnership program of the Future Health Research and Innovation Fund, the Stan Perron Charitable Foundation and the BrightSpark Foundation".

(c) References to the Fellowship should include the correct title: "Western Australian Early-Career Child Health Researcher Fellowship".

16. Dissemination

- (a) Fellows are requested to forward copies of publications and other research communication activities resulting from the funded Fellowship to the Program Administrator.
- (b) In order to maximise knowledge exchange, funding recipients must comply with the NHMRC's 'Publication and dissemination of research: a guide supporting the Australian Code for the Responsible Conduct of Research', which can be downloaded from the

Australian Code for the Responsible Conduct of Research page, and the NHMRC's <u>Open Access Policy</u>.

- (c) All peer-reviewed publications that are supported in whole or in part by the Program Sponsors must be made immediately open access, that is, without any embargo period at the time of first online publication, regardless of whether such publication is an advanced or early online publication or the Version of Record. Funding recipients are encouraged to upload to a pre-print site any draft publication or report resulting in whole or in part from the funded Activity prior to submission to a peer-reviewed publication (if permitted by the publisher) The funding recipient must notify the Program Administrator of all publication Digital Object Identifiers (DOIs). If the paper is peer-reviewed and published, the funding recipient must notify the Program Administrator of the publication DOI.
- (d) The corresponding author's Open Researcher and Contributor Identification (ORCiD) should also be notified to the Program Administrator.

17. Privacy Statement

- (a) In this Privacy Statement, the term Personal Information has the meaning given to that term in the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth).
- (b) The Program Administrator will ensure that any Personal Information received from an applicant in connection with their application is used and disclosed only to the extent necessary for the purposes of assessment of the application, any award made and any required reporting requirements by law or by a Regulatory Authority.
- (c) The Program Administrator will take all reasonable steps to ensure that Personal Information managed by it in connection with the application and any award is protected against misuse, interferences and loss, and from unauthorised access, modification and disclosure.
- (d) By applying, the applicant acknowledges that the Program Administrator may use their Personal Information for purposes in connection with the application and any award and may disclose their Personal Information to the Research Entity for the purposes of any award.

Annexure 1 - NHMRC Investigator Grants 2023 Peer Review Guidelines

Extract from the NHMRC Investigator Grants 2023 Peer Review Guidelines (Appendix H Statement of Expectations):

Emerging Leadership Level 1 (EL1)

It is expected that EL1 Investigator Grant recipients will typically be between 0 and 5 years post PhD (or equivalent) and will be beginning to gain recognition in their research area with demonstrated:

- original contribution(s) in their field of expertise
- ability to contribute to the conception of research projects
- scientific contributions within their region, state or territory (e.g. community leadership, state level contribution to a professional society)
- limited but developing supervision of research staff and students
- contributions within their department, centre, institution or organisation e.g. organising journal clubs, seminar series etc.

It is also expected that Emerging Leadership applicants will be working within a larger team under the mentorship of more senior researchers.

Qualification Equivalency

If the applicant holds a research higher degree that is not a PhD or has equivalent research experience, the applicant's Administering Institution must confirm that, in its judgement, the applicant's qualification or research experience meets the level 10 criteria of the *Australian Qualifications Framework Second Edition January 2013*⁷ and must provide evidence of that judgement, if requested by the Program Administrator.

The Program Administrator reserves the right, at any time during the application or peer review process, to exclude applicants who, in its judgement, do not have appropriate qualifications or experience.

Annexure 2 - Aboriginal Application Guidance

Aboriginal child health research projects must:

- Demonstrate appropriate community engagement with Aboriginal individuals and communities at all stages of the research project.
- Demonstrate potential benefit specifically addressing outcomes for Aboriginal children in Western Australia.
- Demonstrate sustainability and transferability of project outcomes into the future.
- Show that measures have been put in place, that include agreements with community and/or any Aboriginal researchers on the team, to ensure that all data collected within the parameters of the program align with Indigenous Data Sovereignty principles.
